NSW Community Attitudes Survey

Results published during RTK. Key findings:

- 89% of respondents felt that their right to access government information was important, consistent with 89% in 2022 and 90% in 2021
- 67% of respondents were aware that they had the right to access information from at least one of the agencies under NSW information access laws, an increase from 55% in 2022
- Significantly, the proportion of those who indicated that the agencies were very helpful doubled from 2021 to 2023 (40% in 2023; up from 19% in 2021).

IPC Annual Report 2022/23

Tabled in Parliament on 16 October 2023

Highlights:

- 22 strategic and regulatory initiatives finalised across the IPC's Strategic Plan
- finalisation of 704 information access and privacy reviews and complaints
- 449 information access and privacy advices provided to support compliance by agencies
- finalisation of 5 proactive information access audits and 1 privacy audit
- release of the updated Information Governance Agency Self-assessment Tools
- Commissioners provided submissions to 6 reviews and inquiries conducted by government
- 3,096 enquiries dealt with from the public
- 547,220 page views and an 18.9% increase in website visits
- raising awareness of privacy and information access rights with the release of 34 new information access, privacy and corporate publications, and 66 updated publications during 2022/23
- research into informal release of information completed.

Significant regulatory matters

- IPC provided a joint submission to the Al Inquiry, available via the IPC website
- Open Government Forum and NAP3 in progress
- Revised delegations from the Information Commissioner that considered new statutory functions under the MNDB Scheme and the PID Act 2022
- IPC received its first DRF advice request since early July
- Information Commissioner referred the six identified councils in the Local Government Audit to the Office of Local Government for non-compliance
- IPC has completed implementation of Informal Release reporting via the IPC GIPA Tool
 & commenced reminders for agencies to submit their GIPA data to the IPC
- AIAC met on 3 November, discussion included:
 - The operation of the Cabinet- in-Confidence provisions
 - Joint work to examine exemptions, COPIADs and OPIADs
 - New case management systems

Public Interest Disclosures Act 2022

- The *Public Interest Disclosures Act 2022* (PID Act) commenced on 1 October and applies to all NSW public sector agencies.
- The PID Act provides a framework for public officials to report serious wrongdoing in the public sector, and to be protected when they do so.
- Under the PID Act, the NSW Information Commissioner is responsible for receiving complaints made as PIDs about government information contraventions under the *Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009* (GIPA Act).
- IPC has resources to assist:
 - Checklist for reporting a public interest disclosure (PID) alleging a government information contravention
 - Flowchart Public Interest Disclosure (PID) Decision Tree
 - **NEW** What is serious wrongdoing? Government Information Contravention

Information access NCAT matter

Stephanie Zillman v NSW Treasury

- Administrative review of NSW Treasury's decision under the GIPA Act
- The government information is correspondence between NSW Treasury, Catholic Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust (CMCT) and the NSW Auditor-General
- CMCT was consulted under s. 54 of the GIPA Act and objects to the release of the information
- CMCT is now heard in the NCAT proceedings and also applied to be a party
- The issue is whether CMCT can:
 - no longer rely on the objections to the release of the information given by s. 54 consultation
 - now claim that the information is the excluded information of the Auditor-General
 - now claim that the information is subject to secrecy laws which apply to the Auditor-General.
